## “Dear Gordon Brown ...” - a mother’s personal campaign

Autism mother, Polly Tommey’s journey continues in her pursuit of the attention of Prime Minister Gordon Brown on behalf of the thousands of mothers of children with autism in the UK.



Yesterday, Polly and her son Billy, who is a 12 year old and has autism, went to 10 Downing Street to deliver her letter requesting a personal meeting with Mr Brown.



For most mothers that would be enough, but not for Polly Tommey. Polly has also secured extensive support from the advertising world and now also has her name and telephone number plastered across premium billboard sites throughout the United Kingdom in the hope that this will convince Mr Brown to get in touch. Made possible by a generous group of commercial donors, the extensive billboard campaign allows Polly to make her personal appeal in a very public way, in the hope of securing some time to speak to Gordon Brown about the future of her 12 year old son Billy and the thousands of other children and adults with autism in London and the rest of the UK. Over £500,000 of space, time and input has been donated for this specific campaign.



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Polly Tommey is not only an inspirational and dynamic mother as well as being Editor-in-Chief of The Autism File magazine, but she is also the Founder of the registered charity The Autism Trust. Her campaign is intended to highlight the critical situation that individuals with autism and their families live with.

Polly says, "Autism has become a taboo subject here in the UK. It affects over half a million people and yet our government and political leaders appear to disregard the often overwhelming stress and demands faced by families of those with autism. This is not a passing matter; autism numbers have increased dramatically in the last twenty years from 1 in 10,000 in 1988 to 1 in 100 today. Unless the problems of autism are understood; unless services become more available; and unless support is more widespread, we will see an underclass of disaffected and desperate autism households emerge."

Polly continues, "We want better support, we want politicians to engage with us and we want the acknowledgement and support that our children deserve as fully contributing members of society."

Polly wants to hear back from Gordon Brown, to explain to him why the untapped potential of so many with autism has to be embraced; discrimination has to be overcome; and the personal lives of this important and large autism population have to be supported.

Polly concludes, "Billy has a bleak future today in our blinkered world. He is the inspiration to all of us in our family and everyone who meets him. It is simply not fair that his potential is dismissed."
